Scroll Saw Artist and Woodworker

Looking around Trinity Lutheran Church we can see the efforts of members of the congregation who have made cabinets for the organ speakers, a platform for the cymbelstern, and the Lenten cross. The crucifix under the choir loft that we see as we leave the sanctuary and the stand for the marriage unity candles (which resides in the sacristy at other times) were made by the late Gordon Licht. This snippet will focus on Darren Laupp, the scroll artist and woodworker. Various News of the Son issues and church bulletins have contained much of this information and he graciously provided a visit to his shop.

The walls of his house are adorned with his work but the woodshop in the basement has many more on display. His wood stockpile includes some ordered, some acquired from travels, and some from Gordon Licht's shop. His special talent, Intarsia woodworking, "uses varied shapes, sizes, and species of wood fitted together to create a mosaic-like artwork by using the grain pattern and natural colorings to create variations in the design" as he wrote for the April 2024 News of the Son.



The Intarsia project begins with a design and then, using an adhesive to stick the design to the various pieces of wood, to be cut on the scroll saw. Then machine- and hand- sanding and shaping, gluing, and sealing. Time logs are kept of every project.

Beginning in March 2020 Darren began to design a new processional cross and stand (with Ms. Molly Siegel at Koonse Glass and Carol Morrison of TLC for the stained glass designs and the Center for Liturgical Arts at Concordia University Nebraska for the two figures of Christ). These efforts were supported by the Dr. Roger L. Morrison Memorial Fund. The cross was dedicated September 13, 2020, the day before Holy Cross Day. Twenty different woods were used in the base. The Morrison fund also supported the acolyte candle stands, built of seven layers, in 2024.

Three other projects from the Darren's workshop: First, the Clark family donated a figure of Christ made by the father of Trinity Member Bob Clark. Darren cleaned and stained the corpus and made "the cross out of Peruvian walnut, since the straightness of the grain would not distract from the corpus, and mounted the corpus on the cross." This hangs in the overflow room and was put on display in March 2023. Second, beginning in 2022, design began on the two shelves for the collection of the individual cups from communion. In 2023 production of the Living Vine Shelves with multiple woods began and they were installed in March 2024. Third, "who you gonna call" when you urgently need a support (that was inadvertently decluttered from storage) for the Lenten cross: Darren Laupp.

Endowment Fund News

Did you know that Trinity Lutheran has funds available to help with the expenses of those in the congregation pursuing an education in church-related work? Did you know that this help can be in addition to any scholarship funds awarded through the church?

The Main Endowment Fund was created 16 years ago to foster Christian stewardship by special gifts and requests for the many missions of Trinity Lutheran Church. Presently, there are three such "endowment" funds: the main fund, the Bourret/Elliott fund for church-related educational careers, and the Youth Fund. Presently, the balance of all three funds is just shy of \$248,000.

Did you know that in the 16 years since these endowments came into being, no money has ever been disbursed from them? Why? Because no one has ever asked for it!

All donations or bequests are gratefully accepted in furtherance of the mission of Trinity Lutheran Church, and we are anxious to entertain requests for financial support that comport with the restrictions on some of the endowment accounts. As an example, the Bourret/Elliott fund is restricted to providing educational support for those pursuing careers in church-related work, and cannot be used for anything else. Because there is a balance of just over \$100,000 in this restricted fund, we're eager to hear from students who would benefit from this support. The intent, of course, is to facilitate the church-related careers of our young people.

THEME OF THE WEEK

That You May Believe and Have Life in His Name | On the Lord's Day, St. John the apostle was given a revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ, the incarnate Son of God, the Alpha and Omega, the First and the Last. He is the Living One, "the firstborn of the dead" (Rev. 1:5). He died for all people, and behold, He is alive forevermore! Therefore, He has "the keys of Death and Hades" (Rev. 1:18). For His death atoned for sin and conquered death, and in His resurrection He opened the kingdom of heaven to us. The "sharp two-edged sword" of His mouth (Rev. 1:16) calls you to "believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God," that by such faith "you may have life in his name" (John 20:31). To that end, He sends His ministers of the Word, as the Father sent Him, "to give repentance to Israel and forgiveness of sins" (Acts 5:31).

PRAYER OF THE WEEK

Almighty God, grant that we who have celebrated the Lord's resurrection may by Your grace confess in our life and conversation that Jesus is Lord and God; through the same Jesus Christ, Your Son, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY CATECHISM

Catechetical Theme: The Essential Work of a Pastor | As a pastor serves the people of God, he is asked to carry out a wide range of tasks. He will perform administrative tasks: creating agendas, planning schedules, calling volunteers, and encouraging those who serve. He will carry out the duties of an evangelist: following up with visitors, calling on those who have been absent, teaching those who are new to the faith, and caring for all in the process. He will also engage in specific acts of pastoral care: visiting the sick and dying, bringing the Lord's Supper to those who are unable to attend Divine Service, praying for all, and encouraging the downtrodden with God's wonderful promises. Of course, there are sermons to prepare and preach; multiple Bible classes to prepare and teach; hymns to select and a host of other tasks that must be done—the list could go on and on. With so much to keep track of, both the pastor and the people can forget those things that are essential to the pastoral office—those things which Christ instituted the office to carry out. This week's catechetical material reminds us of the essential work of a pastor—work which is given by Christ Himself.

Catechism: What is the Office of the Keys? The Office of the Keys is that special authority which Christ has given to His Church on earth to forgive the sins of repentant sinners, but to withhold forgiveness from the unrepentant as long as they do not repent. Where is this written? St. John the Evangelist writes in chapter twenty: The Lord Jesus breathed on His disciples and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven." (John 20:22-23) What do you believe according to these words? I believe that when the called ministers of Christ deal with us by His divine command, in particular when they exclude openly unrepentant sinners from the Christian congregation and absolve those who repent of their sins and want to do better, this is just as valid and certain, even in heaven, as if Christ our dear Lord dealt with us Himself.
