### What a Friend We Have in Jesus

The hymn "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," found as hymn 770 in the *Lutheran Service Book* (LSB), is cherished by many for its simple yet profound message of comfort and trust in Christ through prayer. This hymn emphasizes the accessibility of God's grace, the gift of prayer, and the intimate relationship believers share with Jesus as their Savior and friend.

Written in 1855 by Joseph Medlicott Scriven (1819–1886), an Irish-born Canadian, the text of "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" was penned during a time of personal hardship. Scriven's life was marked by tragedy: his fiancée drowned the night before their wedding, and later, after relocating to Canada, another fiancée died before they could marry. Amid these losses, Scriven wrote the poem as a private reflection to comfort his ailing mother in Ireland. Originally titled "Pray Without Ceasing," the text was not intended for public use but was later discovered and published by a friend.

The hymn's opening line, "What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear," establishes Jesus as both a compassionate friend and the bearer of human sin and sorrow. This resonates with Lutheran Christology, which holds that Jesus is fully God and fully human, capable of sympathizing with human weakness while possessing the divine nature to redeem. The biblical foundation for this imagery is found in John 15:13–15, where Jesus declares, "Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. ... I have called you friends."

Additionally, the phrase "all our sins and griefs to bear" echoes Lutheran soteriology (fifty cent word meaning doctrine of salvation), which emphasizes Christ's atoning work on the cross. Hebrews 4:15–16 reinforces this: "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace." In Lutheran worship, this encourages believers to approach God boldly in prayer, trusting in Christ's mediation.

The hymn's refrain, "What a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer," underscores prayer as a gift of grace. Prayer is not a work that earns God's favor but a response to the Gospel, enabled by the Holy Spirit. Prayer is an act of faith, trusting God's promises to hear and answer. This is rooted in biblical texts like Philippians 4:6–7: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." The hymn's emphasis on bringing "everything" to God aligns with this exhortation, assuring believers that no concern is too small or too great for God's care.

The second stanza, "Have we trials and temptations? Is there trouble anywhere? We should never be discouraged—take it to the Lord in prayer," further reflects this theology. It echoes 1 Peter 5:7, "Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you."

The hymn's third stanza, "Are we weak and heavy laden, cumbered with a load of care? Precious Savior, still our refuge—take it to the Lord in prayer." Believers, burdened by sin or suffering, find refuge in Christ alone, not in their own merits. This is grounded in Matthew 11:28–30, where Jesus says, "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." This rest is the peace of forgiveness and reconciliation with God, received through faith.

Other biblical references to ponder:

- John 15:13–15: Jesus as a friend who lays down His life, emphasizing His sacrificial love and relational intimacy.
- Hebrews 4:15-16: Christ's empathy and role as high priest, encouraging bold prayer.
- Philippians 4:6-7: The call to pray about everything, receiving God's peace in return.
- 1 Peter 5:7: Casting all anxieties on God, who cares for His people.
- Matthew 11:28–30: Jesus as the source of rest for the weary.
- 1 Timothy 2:5: Christ as the sole mediator, affirming direct access to God.
- Romans 8:34: Jesus' intercession for believers, grounding prayer in His ongoing work.



### Pastoral Viographies

Rev. Edgar M. Priess 1977 - 1981

The Reverend Edgar Martin Priess was born in Montevideo, MN on November 10, 1922 to Rev. Paul Priesz (born in Germany) and Hulda (neé Rockman) Priesz (born in Iowa of parents who were born in Germany). His draft card from 1942 still showed the Priesz spelling and future records show that at least one of his brothers retained the original spelling. He had three older sisters and three younger brothers, one of whom, Paul, also became a pastor. He attended school at Concordia College in St. Paul, Minnesota and Northwestern College of Watertown, Wisconsin. The latter college merged with Dr. Martin Luther College of New Ulm, Minnesota in 1995 to form Martin Luther College (Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod). He attended Concordia Seminary in St. Louis where he graduated in 1949. That same year he married Shirley "Jane" Maret with the marriage record of Christ Lutheran Church in St. Louis showing the Priess spelling. They had three children, Michele, Barbara, and Dennis, with both daughters being married before Rev. Priess came to Columbia.

Rev. Priess was ordained in Leader, Saskatchewan, Canada where he remained for four years. He was a Parish Pastor at multiple other churches before coming to Colum-

bia: Ortonville, Minnesota for eight years, Cody, Wyoming for seven years, Trinity Lutheran in Norborne, Missouri for seven years, and Christ Lutheran in Boyne City, Michigan for five years before his installation at Trinity Lutheran in Columbia on October 16, 1977. The names of the other congregations were not discovered. The installing pastor at Trinity was Rev. Herman Scherer (the president of the Missouri District who had overseen Trinity's dismissal of Pastor Swanson) and the liturgist was Rev. Henry Kleindienst (who had resigned from the pastoral ministry at TLC in 1975 but had remained a member of the congregation and organized the hospital ministry).

The attendance at voters' meetings and church services (between 200 and 250) had declined after the departure of many members of TLC who agreed with Pastor Swanson's evangelism philosophy and believed his false charismatic teaching. In a January 1978 voters' meeting, Pastor Priess discussed plans to divide the 188 families remaining in membership between the seven elders for them to visit that year in an effort to determine who still desired to be affiliated with Trinity. His other goals included increased attendance to Bible classes, three youth groups (6-8th graders, high school

and post-high school), active stewardship and evangelism, and two general assemblies of confirmands every year. The LCMS 1977 synodical convention Parish Planning Manual had the general theme for the year "That We May Grow." Each month had a special emphasis (e.g. November: Personal and Corporate Stewardship) and these were listed in the pastor's letter in the TLC News, Vol. III, No. 10.

By February 1978, the Board of Elders had begun calling the families. The Board of Evangelism continued "using the Kennedy's approach" with six individuals on two teams making calls. New families received into membership by profession of faith and/or transfer from sister congregations increased. The pastor hoped to reach 100 new families that year and grow Sunday attendance to 300. A young couples' club was promoted in addition to the Fellowship Club and women's groups. A Lutheran "Open House" program in October 1978 led to about 50 new members in addition to the 25 new members the month before.

In September 1978, the Board of Education requested that the church consider a Director of Christian Education (D.C.E.). The position's duties included directing a formal music program and coordinating youth activities (November voters' meeting). During the same meeting, Pastor Priess reported on the failure of Calvary Lutheran (the church Pastor Swanson formed after his dismissal from Trinity) to be accepted into the Missouri District of the LCMS. The report prepared by TLC for the Missouri District Convention has not been found in the archives.

Pastor Priess was assigned to select and hire the D.C.E., but found the task difficult due to a lack of musical proficiency among the candidates. After a visit with the Board of Elders, Rev. Alvin Lange (born in 1937) was hired to serve until the summer of 1980, with plans to continue searching for a permanent D.C.E.. Rev. Lange (who had been installed as pastor of Trinity, Norborne in 1965) began in January 1980 and immersed himself in the role. The Board of Education asked him "to do ground work in researching the feasibility and the organization of a Christian Day Care Center" (from his Director of Christian Education Report for the March 1980 voters' meeting) and they hoped to open in the fall. He and his wife, Sylvia, participated in the Young Adult Bible Class. He played the organ, worked with the junior and senior choirs, and directed instrumentalists and soloists during the Divine Service. He hoped to organize a bell choir if they could "interest individuals in buying handbells" – the Emil Gramm family would give a set in the next few years. At the end of his time as D.C.E., Rev. Lange preached for Pastor Priess, who was on vacation, at TLC on the morning of August 3, 1980. Right afterward, he traveled to Jefferson City for his installation that evening as Associate Pastor of Faith Lutheran Church.

In May 1980, the Board of Christian Education received approval for the Day Care Center and Theresa Yeager agreed to be director. Pastor Priess suggested a governing board with himself to be appointed as a board member and in June Rev. Lange presented the proposed "Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws of Trinity Lutheran Child Learning Center." In September the TLCLC was operating with 28 students and a little financial support (to supplement tuition) from TLC.

Pastor Priess requested the Voters' Assembly grant him a "peaceful release" from Trinity at the earliest opportunity due to "health problems" in December 1980. The Assembly voted to have a special Voters' meeting in January 1981 to consider the request. The December minutes recorded: "It is important to note that the consensus of this assembly was that the Pastor has brought vision and leadership to Trinity during a difficult time in the church, and that he has been a good Shepherd to his flock." At the January 4, 1981 meeting he again requested a peaceful release from duties at Trinity Lutheran Church to accept a call from Trinity Lutheran in Clark's Fork and Immanuel Lutheran in Pleasant Grove, Missouri. Bob Clark, the chairman of the Board of Elders, recommended that the

voters grant Pastor Priess the peaceful release and the voters complied. His last service at Trinity was on February 22, 1981, and was followed by a farewell luncheon for Pastor and Mrs. Priess. "He served numerous vacancies and was a 'supply' preacher for many congregations in the greater Kansas City area." He was a guest speaker at the 75th anniversary worship services at Trinity Lutheran in July 2000.

His obituary, printed in the November 2003 News of the Son, stressed his love for the parish ministry. "He had a heart for evangelism, youth work, Bible study, and the pastoral care of his beloved parishioners." He "entered the Kingdom of Glory surrounded by his loving wife and family members on Tuesday, September 16, 2003 in Liberty, Missouri" and is buried in Glenridge Cemetery in Liberty.

### June 10, 2025 Board of Directors (draft meeting minutes)

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors was held in the Fellowship Hall on June 10, 2025, beginning at 6:30 p.m. The following board members attended: Larry McCoig (President), Pastor Thieme, Pastor McCalley, Annette Kiehne, Warren Harms, Keith Davis, David Attebery, John Frerking, Kimberly Walker, Dan Watts, Emily Derendinger, Travis Vellema, Jensen Duenckel, Jacque Eckhoff, and Debbie Antel (Secretary).

President McCoig called the meeting to order. Pastor Thieme opened the meeting with a devotion and prayer. Jensen Duenckel made a motion to approve the meeting agenda; seconded and approved.

Keith Davis, Financial Secretary, presented the report of operating income through May 31. Comments from his report: Regular envelope year-to-date actual collections are \$265,667.60. After 5 months, the projected 2025 regular envelope collections are more than the 2025 budget. Loose plate year-to-date collections are \$36,231.26. The 2025 loose plate budget of \$17,450. The year-to-date 2025 building fund collection is \$66,041.87.

The motion to receive the Financial Secretary's report was seconded and approved.

Warren Harms, Treasurer, presented the finance year 2025 reports ending May 31 and answered questions.

The motion to receive the Treasurer's reports was seconded and approved.

The consent agenda includes the minutes from the May 13, 2025 regular meeting, Pastor Thieme's report, Pastor McCalley's report, and the following board reports: Elders, Christian Education, Early Childhood Education - TLCLC Director, and Youth.

David Attebery made a motion to approve the consent agenda; seconded and approved.

#### **Old Business**

Information Only:

Bylaws – printed copies of the revised bylaws were distributed, and additional copies are available from the church office. The revision is also available on the church website.

Verizon contract (cell tower) – the effective date of the yet-to-be signed Agreement has been changed from August 2025 to January 2026, to coincide with our budget year.

Copier/printer – the new machine for the church

office has been ordered.

#### **New Business**

Board of TLC Endowment Fund: Robert Hall was unable to attend the meeting. President McCoig advanced his request on behalf of the Board of TLC Endowment Fund to allocate \$5,000 to each Matthew Frerking and Josiah Thieme for the academic year 2025-2026; half in the fall semester and half in the spring semester with funds to be drawn from the Bourret/Elliott Endowment Fund and directed to the respective Concordia University. Keith Davis made a motion to approve the request; the motion was seconded and after discussion was approved.

Playground Renovation: President McCoig noted that the Assembly of Voters had previously approved the use of grant funds and requested confirmation of the date on which the approval occurred. Dan Watts responded that the approval was granted in September 2023.

Dan Watts, on behalf of the Board of Early Childhood Education, presented the Plan of Action regarding Project 2 of Phase #1. He also provided a six-page document detailing the cost estimates (\$88,798.93), funding options (\$89,250), and product descriptions and specifications. The motion from the Board of Early Childhood Education was seconded and discussion followed.

The Plan of Action report includes these points: 4) The existing climbing structure and swing set will be removed and new structures will be erected in the same locations taking into account required clearances. Permeable shade structures will be erected over the new climbing structure and over approximately one-half of the oval area. 5) The BOECE has approved this project. The cost of this project is expected to exhaust the remaining \$71,480 in grant funds earmarked for "playground renovations." Any additional funds (if needed) will come from memorials and/or donations to the Learning Center.

After further discussion, the motion was approved.

Facility Use Request: David Attebery made a motion to approve the Application for Facility Use for the Fellowship Hall and Kitchen on November 22, 2025, 9 a.m. – 5 p.m., per Elke Beltz. The motion was seconded and approved.

David Attebery made a motion to adjourn the meeting; seconded and approved. Pastor McCalle closed the meeting with prayer. The meeting adjourned at 6:55 p.m.



"Sí, quiero."

There are memes upon memes about a phrase heard at the end of many a conversation with Dominicans: "si Dios quiere" (Lord willing). Many feature empty promises that the speaker will do something like go to the gym "si Dios quiere"; others hint at taking a luxury vacation or falling in love "si Dios quiere" while a stereotypically bearded, elderly God says "No quiero." "Si Dios quiere" can also be a convenient way to turn down an invitation without actually saying no; I'm not innocent of having tried that tack!

Indeed, the verbiage of religiosity runs deep in this place, and in much of Latin America. Bible verses, inspirational phrases, and even somewhat harshsounding reminders are ubiquitous on storefronts, concrete pylons, bridges, vehicles, and more. Experience, however, teaches that too often, such blatant expressions of faith—verbal, graffitied, or otherwise—are just that: expressions. James 4:15 gently prompts,

Instead you ought to say, "If the Lord wills, we will live and do this or that.

The preceding verses allude to the fact that we have no control over the future or foreknowledge of it. Instead, we each submit to God's perfect plan for our lives. 
#### Sister Churches in Christ


