"I Come, O Savior, to Thy Table": A Lutheran Tapestry of Grace

In the shadowed heart of 17th-century Germany, where candlelit churches glowed against the chill of Reformation's afterglow, Friedrich Christian Heyder penned a hymn that would weave itself into the soul of Lutheran worship. "I Come, O Savior, to Thy Table," found as hymn 618 in the Lutheran Service Book, is a shimmering thread in the tapestry of Eucharistic devotion.

Heyder, a humble deacon in Merseburg and later pastor in Zörbig, crafted this hymn—originally fifteen verses long—as a catechesis on the Lord's Supper. In the LSB, it is divided, with verses 1–5 forming LSB 618, while verses 11–15 became LSB 619 ("Thy Body, Given for Me, O Savior"). The middle verses were omitted, likely for brevity or liturgical focus. This hymn invites worshipers to kneel at Christ's table, where bread and wine become vessels of divine presence of His body and blood, offering forgiveness, life, and salvation in a world weary with sin.

The tune associated with LSB 618 is *Ich Sterbe Täglich* (1756), a melody rooted in the German chorale tradition. This tune, meaning "I die daily," complements the hymn's somber yet hopeful tone, reflecting the Lutheran theology of daily repentance and renewal. Its measured rhythm and solemn melody guide the worshiper into a posture of reverence, aligning with the hymn's focus on approaching Christ's table with humility and faith.

Each verse of LSB 618 is a brushstroke on a canvas of faith, painting the journey of a soul hungering for Christ's presence. The refrain, a golden thread woven through each stanza, pleads for the sacrament to be the soul's highest treasure.

I come, O Savior, to Thy table,
 For weak and weary is my soul;
 Thou, Bread of Life, alone art able
 To satisfy and make me whole: Refrain

ref Lord, may Thy body and Thy blood Be for my soul the highest good!

The hymn opens with a soul trudging through a desolate valley, its strength sapped by the weight of sin. The worshiper, like a parched wanderer, gazes toward Christ, the Bread of Life, whose table gleams like an oasis. Only He can fill the aching void within, transforming weariness into wholeness. The refrain rises as a prayer, yearning for Christ's body and blood to flood the soul with divine light, a foretaste of heaven's feast. (Biblical References: John 6:35; I Corinthians 11:23-25; Psalm 51:17)

Worthiness is not a crown earned but a gift received through faith, and the worshiper bows, eyes lifted to Christ alone, as if gazing into a radiant dawn that burns away doubt. The worshiper seeks to approach the sacrament with reverence, focusing solely on Christ rather than personal worthiness. The refrain echoes, a fervent whisper for the sacrament to anchor the soul in divine love. (Biblical References: 1 Corinthians 11:27–29; Hebrews 12:2; Isaiah 6:5).

3 Unworthy though I am, O Savior, Because I have a sinful heart, Yet Thou Thy lamb wilt banish never, For Thou my faithful shepherd art: Refrain

The soul stands exposed, its heart a cracked vessel stained by sin. Yet Christ, the Shepherd, emerges, staff in hand, His eyes warm with unbreakable promise. He will not cast out His lamb, no matter how wayward. The altar becomes a pasture where the lost are gathered, and the refrain resounds like a bell, calling the heart to rest in the Shepherd's gift of Himself. (Biblical References: John 10:11, 14; Romans 3:23–24; Psalm 23:1)

4 Weary am I and heavy laden; With sin my soul is sore oppressed; Receive me graciously and gladden My heart, for I am now Thy guest. Refrain

Sin slithers like a venomous serpent, its poison threatening the soul's life. The worshiper, standing before the sacred table, prays for a heart that recoils from such darkness, as one might flee a consuming fire. The plea is fervent: to live in the light of grace, shielded from the storm of judgment. The refrain rises again, a shield of hope, trusting Christ's body and blood to purify and protect. (Biblical References: Romans 6:23; Matthew 26:41; Psalm 119:11)

What higher gift can we inherit?
 It is faith's bond and solid base;
 It is the strength of heart and spirit,
 The covenant of hope and grace. Refrain

In this final verse, Christ yearns for sinners to find refuge in His embrace. The altar is a harbor where broken souls are mended, and the refrain soars like a hymn of triumph, proclaiming the sacrament as the soul's eternal treasure (Biblical References: 1 Timothy 2:4; Luke 15:7; Ephesians 2:8–9).

Christ's body and blood, hidden in bread and wine, are no mere symbols but a living promise, delivering forgiveness, life, and salvation. The hymn sings of human frailty and divine fidelity, inviting worshipers to approach the altar with repentant hearts and trusting spirits. It is a teacher guiding Lutherans to confess the sacrament as Christ's work and basking in its comfort.

we have concluded that we must modernize our system of controlling access to the church property. We have reviewed proposals from two local security agencies and recommend that we accept the proposal from Tiger Security to install an electronic entry control system that will allow global and remote door locks and permit effective access control through key entry points. This proposal falls well below the limit of funds that have been set aside for this project, and our intent with this announcement is to make the proposal available for review by the congregation. 

On the Beaten Path



I've been to Belize 4 times already in 2025; 2 more trips await. I stay at Camp Concordia, a beautifully manicured property 3/4 mi. down a gravel road on the banks of the Belize River. I'm resigned to the fact that morning runs are near impossible, so I've been to known to wander the camp grounds while listening to my Bible app audio or Marco Polo-ing to ramp up my step count. This city girl sticks almost exclusively to the somewhat haphazard paved sidewalks. Nevertheless, inevitably traipsing wet grass into the bunkhouse and shaking little rocks out of my off-brand Crocs, I'm

forever wishing there were more of them. My "desire paths" are unmistakable.

The story is told of multiple US universities (e.g. Ohio State, pictured, and the University of Northern Colorado) that examined students' walking behaviors before paving their sidewalks. The resulting walkways, then, align with the student body's "desire paths" - preferred routes for getting between points.

Paths are a common image in Scripture, and its prevailing wisdom jives well with the proven observe-before-paving approach. Take heed the words of Proverbs 4:26:

Ponder the path of your feet; then all your ways will be sure.

My desire paths don't always mesh with God's; I want to meander, He wants to keep me on the straight and narrow. Enter the reassurance of Psalm 119:105:

Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.

Illumined by the Gospel, my feet trod securely on the smooth, level, unobstructed path of life (Psalm 16:11).

Gathering participants had the opportunity to engage further with Danelle during a breakout session the following afternoon; OIM missionaries from Puerto Rico and Cambodia led similar sessions on subsequent days.
