A Journey with "Lord, Take My Hand and Lead Me"

A Journey with "Lord, Take My Hand and Lead Me"

The wooden pews creaked softly as the organ's first notes filled the small Lutheran church, tucked in a quiet corner of the Midwest. It was an ordinary Sunday, but the hymn chosen that morning—"Lord, Take My Hand and Lead Me" (LSB 722)—seemed to carry a deeper resonance. As the congregation's voices rose, tentative at first, then bolder, a woman in the third row brushed tears from her eyes. Her husband had passed just weeks before, and the words of the hymn, penned over a century ago by Julie von Hausmann, wrapped around her like a comforting embrace: "Lord, take my hand and lead me upon life's way."

A Path Marked by Grace

We are all pilgrims on a journey we cannot walk alone. Sin leaves us stumbling, unable to find our way by our own strength or wisdom. As the *Small Catechism* confesses, "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him." The hymn's opening plea is our own—a cry for God's hand to guide us, not because we deserve it, but because His grace flows freely through Christ's sacrifice on the cross.

Picture a young couple standing at the baptismal font, their infant cradled in their arms. The water glistens on the child's forehead, a sign of God's promise to lead him through life. That same hand that claims him in Baptism holds fast to the grieving widow in the pew, guiding her through sorrow's shadow. God's grace is no abstract idea but a living presence, walking with us step by step, sealed in Word and Sacrament.

Tempest and the Cross

The hymn's second stanza tells a harder part of the story: "When the tempest rages, I need not fear ..." Imagine a man sitting at a kitchen table, the weight of a lost job pressing heavy on his heart. "I didn't know how to pray," he might say, "but those hymn lines kept echoing in my mind. It was like God was saying, 'I'm still here.'" Christianity doesn't promise a life free of tempest. Instead, it points to the theology of the cross where God's love shines brightest in our weakness, where Christ's triumph over sin and death becomes our anchor.

This man found solace in the truth that God's Word holds firm, even when feelings falter. The hymn's proclamation that God is "always near. Close by Your side abiding..." calls to mind the promises spoken in the absolution, the bread, that is body, and wine, that is blood, of the Lord's Supper, the sermons that point back to Christ. Like the reformer wrestling with spiritual turmoil centuries ago, we learn to trust the God who never lets go, even when the path feels impossibly dark.

Unto the end

The hymn's final stanza carries us to the journey's end: "When the shadows lengthen And night has come, I know that You will strengthen My steps toward home." Picture an elderly man, his voice trembling as he sings these words in his

final days. He's unafraid, trusting the One who will lead him "Unto the end" -- to the eternal home. Death is not the end but a passage, made safe by Christ's resurrection. Scripture, and thus The Augsburg Confession, proclaims that we are justified by grace through faith, and that faith clings to the promise of eternal life won by Jesus on the cross.

This man's confidence rests not in his own goodness but in the God who carried him through decades of faith—through hardship, loss, and quiet joys. The hymn's image of being lead by His hand speaks of an eternity already secured for us by Christ. As he sings, he joins a chorus of saints, from the early church to today, who trust that God's hand will lead them home.

A Song for Every Step

As the congregation finished singing that Sunday, the final notes of "Lord, Take My Hand and Lead Me" lingered in the air. The woman in the third row wiped her eyes, a faint smile breaking through. The hymn had told her story, the story of the man who lost his job, the story of the elderly man facing eternity—and the story of everyone in that sanctuary. It's a story that confesses our need, celebrates God's grace, and trusts His guidance through life's winding paths to eternity. Whether in the font's waters, the Supper's gifts, or the Word's promises, we are never alone. God's hand is steady, His love unending.

So we sing, in churches and hospital rooms, in moments of doubt and hope: "Lord, take my hand and lead me." And He does—faithfully, forever.

Grief Resource Available

Stephen Ministry has a resource available to you. Journeying through Grief book sets can help you extend care and minister to people you know who are grieving the loss of a loved one. The four short books are intended to be given at 3 weeks, 3 months, 6 months, and 11 months during the first year after a loss. A tracking card is included to record when each book is due to be given and the date they were given. Each 44-page book focuses on the feelings and issues a person is likely to experience at that point in his or her grief, offering comfort, help, and hope throughout that difficult first year.

Although the books are written from a Christian perspective, they address spiritual matters sensitively, with a focus on ideas and principles that would apply for any reader, whatever his or her beliefs.

It is sometimes difficult to know how to minister to others who are grieving. Our hope is this will be a loving and effective way for you to extend care to people in your life. Paraments, Vestments, and Chancel Furniture Committee Update

Trinity Lutheran Church's Paraments, Vestments and Select Chancel Furniture Committee has been meeting regularly since the first of this year. You have already seen some of the committee's progress in the beautifully refurbished chalice and other communion ware.

Now, important decisions have been made regarding paraments and vestments, which are the fabric portion of the committee's work. The altar scarves, falls and stoles that adorn the altar, pulpit, lectern and our pastors' robes are now the main focus of the committee's tasks as asked of them by the congregation. There are at least five liturgical seasons for us to consider, only few studios who offer the guidance and production of these items, and much consideration is given designs and symbolism. We very much look forward to introducing and blessing the first new set of paraments and vestments for the congregation this coming Advent. The next new set will likely be introduced in Lent 2026, thus you will see our existing paraments and vestments for the seasons of Christmas and Epiphany. This slightly irregular replacement schedule accommodates production schedules of skilled artisans.

Centennial Snippet: Trinity LLL Fellowship Club

The club's history began back on February 23, 1960 when the International Lutheran Laymen's League (auxiliary organization of the MO District LCMS) extended the hand of Christian fellowship and presented charter number 2861 to Trinity Lutheran Laymen's League Fellowship Club, Columbia, Missouri.

Under the direction of the Preamble/Constitution of the International Lutheran Laymen's League:

"Acknowledging the rich blessings which Almighty God has showered upon us, especially in that He has brought us to the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, we laymen of the Lutheran Church freely join our hearts and hands in the Christian fellowship of this organization. In doing so, we re-dedicate ourselves, our time, our talents, and our treasurers to the building of the Kingdom of God and the propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We humbly pray the Lord of the Church to keep us steadfast in the faith and to bless our lives and labors so that He may be glorified both here and hereafter."

As a Christ-Centered organization the fellowship club focused on its purpose of bible study, Christian fellowship, supporting the many missions of Lutheran Hour Ministries, and locally supporting Trinity in its programs.

Lutheran Laymen's League or LLL and Lutheran Hour Ministries are the same organization. Lutheran Laymen's League is our legal title, but Lutheran Hour Ministries is what we actually do in "Bringing Christ to the Nations and the Nations to the Church."

Throughout its 64-year history Trinity's LLL Fellowship Club had a very active club and was recognized yearly as one of the top ten clubs in the state supporting many worthwhile missions and servant events. Some of its history includes:

- 1982 LLL cassette tape ministry delivering tapes of Sunday sermons to elderly & shut-ins
- 1986 purchased pancake arill
- 1988 purchased gas stove with 6 burners, 24" grill and 2 ovens
- 1991 installed 3 handicapped parking spots at Trinity
- 1992 purchased 100 new bibles for the Alive in Christ mission church
- 1992 installation of vented hood over gas stove in church kitchen
- 1994 \$1,000 donation to "Go Tell Another Generation", a joint outreach project of the LLL & LCMS, which focuses on bringing 2.5 million unchurched persons into the LCMS fold
- 1996 started the "Project Connect" literature/pamphlet rack covering different topics
- 1997 assisted with the LHM "Living for Tomorrow" campaign
- 1998 donated funds for the Memorial Tower
- 2000 donation to erect stone wall covering kitchen exhaust fan and air conditioning units
- 2000 donated funds and provide labor for the TLCLC Expansion
- 2002 Good Shepherd Lutheran School Cornerstone Donation
- 2002 servant event projects to repair old 8-foot wooded church tables
- 8-foot Fiberglass Table Donation
- Yearly Pancake and Sausage Breakfast Fundraiser
- Yearly Vegetable and Chili Fundraiser
- Advent Devotions
- Lenten Devotions
- Amigos de Cristo (Hispanic Ministry) Donations

Trinity LLL Fellowship Club members have gotten older, members have died, membership has declined as church members' interests have waned to belong/make a commitment so that the club could continue to function.

It is sad to say, at its December 2024 meeting Trinity LLL Fellowship Club voted to cease meeting and be listed as an inactive/dormant auxiliary organization of Trinity Lutheran Church.

Centennial Snippet: The Charter Fifteen

The "Minutes of Trinity Lutheran Church Columbia, Mo. organized March 29, 1925" record a constitution (that received fifteen signatures. That constitution is now lost but voting rights were probably limited to males of at least twenty years of age (four of the signers were only twenty). The first name on the list, (Rev.) A.C. Bernthal, should need no introduction to TLC members but the other fourteen names have not received mention in the summaries of TLC history in the pictorial directories. In gathering information from the TLC registers, newspaper articles, and college yearbooks there may be errors but one error recorded in the 1959-1990 Register will be mentioned at the end. To begin, after A.C.Bernthal:

- 2. **L(ester) A.Vanderschmidt**—MU student (who recorded the very first minutes) went on to be an attorney and Missouri legislator. He died in 1954 while Speaker of the Missouri House and is buried near Mound City, his hometown.
- 3. **Arthur (L) Wal(I)hausen**—MU student, School of Journalism, owner-publisher of the Charleston (MO) Enterprise-Courier for more than 30 years. He died in 1969 in Charleston.
- 4. **Karl R. Bopp** MU student, went on to be a PhD economist, teacher, and world renowned "central bankers banker" per his 1976 obituary. He was president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia 1958-1970 and was the technical secretary at the Bretton Woods Monetary Conference that led to the establishment of the International Monetary Fund.
- 5. **Paul F. Maschoff**—MU Student, football player who played guard and kicked the winning point-after-touchdown that beat Nebraska in 1928. He went on to coach high school football at Hannibal, MO and later was an insurance sales supervisor. He died in 1988 in Kirkwood.
- 8. **Henry (B) Hauschild**—a Columbia resident. His daughter, Laurette, was the bride in the second marriage recorded in the church register. He was on the 1928 building committee. He was

- listed as the engineer of the Guitar Building. He left Columbia in 1951 and died in Denver, Colorado in 1955. He was buried in Columbia with Pastor Neebe presiding.
- 7. **Herbert (W) Reuszer**—MU student in the School of Agriculture who left Columbia in 1926 and received an M.A. and PhD at Rutgers. He was an associate soil microbiologist at Purdue from 1947-1970. He died in August 2000 and was buried in West Lafayette, IN.
- 8. **Walter J. Saupe**—Professor of education at MU, he died in 1940. Pastor Neebe presided at the funeral (fourth burial in the church register).
- 9. **E(rwin) E Goehring**—MU student, BS in Business Administration, left Columbia in 1927 for NC State. He then received an M.A. in Business from U. Chicago and was a Professor of Business and Economics at Valparaiso University for 35 years where he headed the Business Department for seventeen years. He died in Valparaiso, IN in October 2000 (the last of the Charter Fifteen).
- 10. **George Wolf**—owner of a Columbia shoe store until his retirement in 1947. He died in 1959 and Pastor Kleindienst presided at his funeral.
- 11. **L(ouis) W. Schroeder**—a Columbia resident and brother of HC Schroeder. L.W. was an agent for Stark Bros. Nurseries and he died while living in New Haven, MO in 1931.
- 12. **Martin W. Schack**—a Columbia resident, manager of Campus Cabs in the 1930's, and president of the congregation in 1948. He died in 1969 and Pastor Kleindienst presided at his funeral.. He was noted to be a charter member in the church register.
- 13. **F(red) B Jeske**—MU student in the School of Journalism, returned to Ferguson where he was mayor 1939-1945 and manager of Spartan Printing and Publishing Co, of Sparta, IL. He died in 1951 and is buried in Memorial Park Cemetery in St. Louis.
- 14. **H(erman) C. Schroeder**—a Columbia resident, brother of LW Schroeder, died in 1957. His funeral was conducted by Rev. Neebe but there is no entry in the church register.
- 15. **Richard Kuhns**—MU assistant in animal husbandry in 1924 (he had graduated from the U Wisconsin). He returned to Wisconsin where he was a salesman. He died in Bayfield, WI (with forty-five great grandchildren) in 1994.

My attempt to correct an error: L.W. Schroeder was the father of A.H. "Al" Schroeder, born in April 1908 and thus only sixteen years old in March 1925. A.H. was active in the early church (he became a voting member in October 1928 when twenty years old) but incorrectly listed in the TLC register, when he died in 1971, as a charter member.

August 12, 2025 Board of Directors (draft meeting minutes)

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors was held in the Fellowship Hall on August 12, 2025, beginning at 6:30 p.m. The following board members attended: Larry McCoig (President), Pastor McCalley, Annette Kiehne, Warren Harms, Keith Davis, David Attebery, John Frerking, Connie Coil, Dan Watts, Emily Derendinger, Jensen Duenckel, Robert Hall, and Debbie Antel (Secretary). The Church Property Security and Church Community Security Committee Chairman Doug McDowell also attended, together with Committee and BOD member Robert Hall.

President McCoig called the meeting to order. Pastor McCalley opened the meeting with a devotion and prayer and encouraged board members to Bible-study the duties of their respective positions.

President McCoig requested any changes to the meeting agenda: An update to the copier/printer was added to Announcements, and a double panic button and door chime Plan of Action Presentation was added to New Business as Item G. Jensen Duenckel made a motion to approve the meeting agenda as amended; seconded and approved.

Keith Davis, Financial Secretary, presented the report of operating income through July 31. Regular envelopes year-to-date actual collections are \$386,344.52. Loose plate year-to-date collections are \$37,379.53. Building Fund year-to-date collections are \$84,206.87. Other year-to-date collections are \$76,388.22. The motion to receive the Financial Secretary's report was seconded and approved.

Warren Harms, Treasurer, presented the finance year 2025 reports ending July 31 and answered questions. The motion to receive the Treasurer's reports was seconded and approved.

The consent agenda includes the minutes from the July 8, 2025 regular meeting, Pastor Thieme's report, and the following board reports: Elders, Trustees, Christian Education, and Youth. David Attebery made a motion to approve the consent agenda; seconded and approved.

Paraments, Vestments, and Select Chancel Furniture Committee (Worship Upgrades) – the Meeting Minutes from July 15, 2025 are included in the agenda packet. No action was taken.

Motion to form a committee to review time off policies: David Attebery advanced a motion on behalf of the Board of Elders that a committee be formed comprised of people with modern managerial experience and familiarity with current time off recommendations for non-called church workers on the church's end of Trinity Lutheran Church. The purpose of this committee is to review and recommend updates for our church's time off policies for non-called church workers based on the Missouri District Recommendations and modern best practices for time off. The motion was seconded and after discussion was denied.

Motion to schedule 2026 meetings at consecutive times: David Attebery advanced a motion on behalf of the Board of Elders that when boards begin planning their meeting schedules for 2026 that consideration be given to scheduling their respective monthly meetings on a Sunday afternoon (or an agreeable workday evening) where two or three boards may be meeting at consecutive times to maximize time management for the pastors. The motion was seconded and after discussion was approved.

(Note: This information will be included in the orientation packet for the 2026 officers and board members.)

Sunday School Classrooms: Connie Coil, on behalf of the Board of Christian Education, presented the Plan of Action which includes these points: 1.) The Sunday School classrooms (Rooms 123 and 124 off the gym) are overcrowded due to increasing attendance. 2.) The Sunday School has a need for additional dedicated space to accommodate our teachers, children, and parents, 3.) The Board of Christian Education would like to use Room 122 in addition to 123 and 124 for Sunday School and would like to have all three classrooms dedicated for use by the Sunday School and not share the space with TLCLC. The Board would like to remove all outdated technology. The Board would like to repaint the classrooms after decluttering each space. 4.) The Board will meet with TLCLC and BOECE to discuss use of the current Sunday School classrooms and Room 122 and determine how we can proceed with expansion. 5.) The Board of Christian Education would like to see a resolution to this matter by the end of August. The motion was seconded and after discussion was denied.

(Note: It was recommended the Board of Christian Education and the Board of Early Childhood Education meet to discuss options.)

Door Security System Proposal: Doug McDowell, on behalf of the Church Property Security and Church Community Security Committee, presented the Plan of Action and motion for the BOD to approve the Tiger Security door security system proposal (\$21,505 - detailed proposal included in the agenda packet), with additions as needed to cover the specific needs of all doors determined by the committee and trustees to be necessary, using previously identified available funds of \$47,805 with work to be completed in 2025 or in 2026 and to approve of making the same motion to the AOV in September. The effectiveness of the system will be reviewed within six months of the "go live" date. The motion was seconded and after discussion was approved.

(Note: The motion will be presented to the Assembly of Voters on September 14.)

Double Panic Button and Door Chime Proposal: Doug McDowell, on behalf of the Church Property Security and Church Community Security Committee, presented the Plan of Action for a way to alert others in the building that there may be a security incident occurring in the church office to which they need to respond and also for a door chime that would alert the secretary when someone was entering the exterior door of the church office entrance during office hours.

The motion is for the BOD to approve funding (\$1,495 - detailed proposal included as part of the agenda packet) and installation of a double panic button and a door chime, using previously identified available funds of \$47,805 with work to be completed ASAP. The effectiveness of the system will be reviewed within six months of installation.

The motion was seconded and after discussion was approved.
